In this activity, we'll explore different housing situations and share our preferences. In groups of 3 or 4, one person reads a question and each person answers in turn and gives a reason. For example: "Would you rather live in a big city apartment or a small countryside house? Why?" – "I would choose the countryside house because I love peace and being close to nature. Also, I prefer having more space."

1. Urban vs. Rural:

Would you rather live in a high-rise apartment in a bustling city or a quiet farmhouse surrounded by fields?

2. Traditional vs. Modern:

Would you rather live in an ancient castle with history and charm or a futuristic smart home with high-tech gadgets?

3. Small vs. Spacious:

Would you rather live in a tiny house with minimal space but low expenses or a spacious mansion with high upkeep costs?

4. Natural vs. Artificial Surroundings:

Would you rather live in a treehouse in the middle of a forest or an underwater house with ocean views?

5. Location Priorities:

Would you rather live close to work but in a smaller, less attractive home, or further away in a larger, beautiful home?

6. Extreme Environments:

Would you rather live in a desert home with air conditioning or a snowy cabin with a fireplace?

7. Fixed vs. Mobile Housing:

Would you rather live in a permanent house or a mobile home that lets you travel anywhere?

8. Proximity to Nature:

Would you rather live by the beach with ocean views or in the mountains with breathtaking landscapes?

9. Neighbours vs. Privacy:

Would you rather live in a cosy neighbourhood where everyone knows each other or in a remote home with complete privacy?
